Space Camp 2023

On Saturday 9 September, 14 Eltham High School students and two teachers (Ross Pringle and Naomi Edrees) left for 16 days on a trip to the USA

Huntsville - Alabama

The first stop on our trip was at Space Camp in Huntsville, Alabama, after three flights and 27 hours in transit!

At Space Camp, our days were filled with fun activities and history lessons where we learnt about some of NASA's missions. Some of the activities included simulated real-life missions on and off the ground and creating and launching our own rockets. We flew jet aircraft simulators and went scuba diving so that we could experience a neutral buoyancy environment, the same environment that real astronauts train in!

We had multiple group activities, like constructing a heat shield, building a rover, and building and launching our rockets.

Over the course of the six days, we got to complete three missions, two of which lasted for an hour and the last mission went for three. For each mission, everybody was assigned a role, some of where we were suspended in the air to do tasks on a simulated spacewalk.

After the six days we graduated, before we went on some outings around Huntsville! The first place we went to was Bob Jones High School. We were able to talk with and get to know some of the kids who attend Bob Jones High School. We then went to Walmart and got snacks for the football game that we were attending that night. At the game, we were able to see some of the friends we made during the day. We saw cheerleaders and a marching band. We then spent our last night in Alabama back at Space Camp, where we would have to wake up early for our morning flight to Atlanta, and then Orlando.

Our first day in was spent relaxing, getting to know the area. On our second we spent the first half the day at Volcano Bay and had an exciting time on all the water slides. The other half of the day, we spent at Islands of Adventure. We explored all the areas of the theme park and went on heaps of rides. The different sections of Islands of Adventure were themed, and they were all filled with extraordinary detail from the media that they were based off. We saw Hogsmeade from Harry Potter, Marvel Superhero Island, Jurassic Park and more.

On the third day, we visited Kennedy Space Centre and learned more about space and the people who went there. We even met John M. Fabian who is an astronaut and has been to space twice! He told us all about his life before and after NASA. We also spent an entire day at the main Universal Park. The themed areas here included Springfield from the Simpsons, Diagon Alley from Harry Potter, Production Central, multiple city-themed areas and more.

San Francisco - California

San Francisco was our final destination, where we spent four days and three nights. On our first day, we were able to settle in and make the most of our free afternoon and grab a bite to eat. On the second day, we visited the Muir Woods. The Muir woods were a quiet and peaceful way to spend time with our friends and see the all the flora and fauna it had to offer. The animals that we spotted the most were deer and baby salmon. The gift shop at the Muir Woods was filled with items made from recycled and sustainable materials, such as posters and stuffed animals.

After the Muir Woods, we went on a City Tour. We drove past many amazing places, such as Union Square, Castro, the Palace of Fine Arts and of course the Golden Gate Bridge. We were able to get out of the bus and get a proper look around to take some photos. We even drove past the same house that the movie Mrs. Doubtfire was filmed in. On our third day, we went to the Exploratorium.





Later we took a ferry to Alcatraz and spent around two hours on the audio tour, which taught us about the most famous people who were prisoners on the island and the lives of the guards and their families who also lived there. On our last day we were given the opportunity to find things that we wanted to do and places we wanted to visit. People went shopping in Union Square, some played Mini-golf, and went to an arcade, museums, and a ferry. Our last day in San Francisco was also our last day in the US and on the trip, as later that night, we had a long-haul flight back home.

This trip allowed us to experience living as adults and all the responsibility and independence that it comes with. It was a once in a lifetime opportunity, that every one of us loved.

Outdoor Education

Year 12 Outdoor and Environmental Studies - Wilson Promontory National Park

In Week 4 of Term 1, our Year 12 Outdoor and Environmental Studies students had opportunity to participate in a 3-day camp program at Wilsons Promontory National Park located in south-eastern Victoria. The students participated in a variety of activities such as a historical education session with a Parks Victoria ranger, developing their practical skills in recreational activities such as Stand-Up Paddleboarding and hiking, as well as cooking on Trangia stoves and setting up four-person tents (see attached photos below). The students also had the opportunity to experience a phenomenal view at sunset from the summit of Mt Oberon (see attached photo below). The class had an enjoyable experience and learnt how best to apply examples from this environment to their studies in the classroom.









Year 11 Outdoor and Environmental Studies - Warbuton

In Week 5 of Term 1, our Year 11 Outdoor and Environmental Studies students undertook an overnight camp program in Warburton, located in eastern Victoria near the Yarra Ranges and alongside the Upper Yarra River. The students had the opportunity to engage in recreational activities such as river-sledding down the Upper Yarra, caving in the Britannia Creek Caves, and a bush-tucker educational session run by highly experienced staff from an outsourced provider known as Warburton Adventure Co. In addition, the students had the opportunity to camp in four- person tents in a wilderness environment at Starling's Gap Campground and learn how to cook on trangia stoves.

As part of this program and VCE Units 1 & 2 Outdoor and Environmental Studies, students learnt how to apply classroom theory concepts in relation to motivations for seeking outdoor experiences and personal responses to outdoor experiences, and the impacts these internal factors have on the level of participation in, and overall enjoyment of, outdoor environments.





School for Student Leadership

Cups for Change

The Eltham High School Team of Term 2, 2022, is excited to announce that we completed our Community Learning Project successfully!

At the start of our journey, approximately two years ago, the Cups for Change team came up with the idea of selling reusable cups bearing a logo that contains our local butterfly, the Eltham Copper-winged Butterfly, to help the environment and to minimise the amount of waste from single-use cups that goes into the surrounding grounds.

We were aided by our local Member of Parliament, Vicki Ward, and her connections to the community, specifically Melbourne's Level Crossing Removal Project (LXRP), and their social enterprise, Position Promo, which is an Indigenous Australian-run organisation.

One of our very talented students, Coco Bergmann, won our logo design competition, which included our school's name, and an illustration of the Eltham Copper-winged Butterfly. We were able to put this design onto our cups, supplied by Position Promo, finalising our product. This end product was sold for 10 dollars.

We also took advantage of 7-Eleven's Program, #CUPRESCUE and its partner, Simply Cups. This involved 7-Eleven supplying us with towers where people can dispose of the single-use cups that are still used, as we understood that not everyone can buy a reusable cup. The single-use cups are placed into the towers and collected before being taken to our local 7-Eleven for recycling. Not only has this helped waste around the school by reducing the number of disposable cups used, but it has also helped the broader community.

We raised \$530 to give to our local community farm, Edendale Farm, and it will be interesting to see how our money is used

Our project ended by receiving a Certificate of Appreciation from Vicki Ward MP, marking a final triumph in our long, but highly worth-it journey.

Thank you to all the staff who helped us along the way, we could not have done it without you. And to the current students: please remember that this school is a magical place, it is not only the start of life-long friendships and your own CLP, but is also the starting point of many successes in leadership within your lives in the years to come.

The presentation given by our young people focused on a pertinent and urgent topic: the far- reaching impacts of fast fashion on our planet. The young activists eloquently detailed the detrimental effects of the fast fashion industry on the environment, including excessive waste, pollution, and unsustainable consumption patterns. One of the innovative solutions presented was the STEAM upcycling workshop that Year 7 students had recently participated in at EHS. The workshop, aimed at promoting sustainable practices and creative thinking, resulted in the creation of a variety of impressive items made from donated materials, with one standout piece known as "The Pen Glove".

Respect for Diversity

As we began the 2023 school year, Student Leaders spoke to all year levels about our School Values, and what they mean to them.

"Hi everyone. I'm Ava, I use she/they pronouns, I'm a Year 12, and I'm going to be speaking about Respect for Diversity, because I'm the Respect for Diversity leader for 2023.

First of all, welcome to Eltham High.

Given that this is the first run of these presentations, I'll read to you Google's definition of diversity. Diversity is "the practice or quality of including or involving people from a range of different social and ethnic backgrounds and of different genders, sexual orientations, etc." Unsurprisingly, this is a great definition.

Respect for Diversity, at its core is acceptance of the differences in others.

Eltham High values diversity and promotes individuality and embracing one's identity.

The cool thing about the values as a whole is that many of them bleed together – there isn't a clear divide between a lot of them, and they also are the types of characteristics that most people are probably living without being fully aware of it.

I don't think this will shock anyone, but humans are social creatures, and we often crave the feeling of acceptance from our classmates. As such, everyone deserves to feel accepted and supported by the people around them. Feeling different from your friends can be an isolating experience, and the normalisation of diversity can help many people find their people, who they can relate to on a different level. Eltham High can be that space for many people, especially with tons of lunchtime clubs (which are listed in the upper 100s). One of these is StandOUT, for LGBT+ people and allies.

Practicing Respect for Diversity in everyday life can seem daunting, but small changes can make all the difference, and it's tons better than making no change at all. Some ways you can start are by:

Asking for pronouns when meeting someone new (and using them);

Calling out racism, misogyny, and queerphobia in your friend groups (including stereotypes, comments like 'you throw like a girl');

Helping others, and, of course, accepting their differences; So, be good to each other.

VCE-Vocational Major (VM) Fundraiser

A group of VCE-VM students, as part of their course of study, ran a fundraiser for The Salvation Army. They led a community effort to collect a range of clothes, food, other dontables, as well as some money to support families in need.

These Year 11 students, Keagan Pearce, Nicholas James, Jack Brooksby and Dylan Morter are very grateful for the support that they received from the community and wish to express their sincere thanks to everyone who contributed. They know that everyone's effort will support people in need.

Sorry Day

On National Sorry Day, 26 May, the Nation remembers the Stolen Generations. This is part of the ongoing effort towards reconciliation between Indigenous and non- Indigenous Australians.

This Year, School Leader Beau Duder (Year 12, Rutter House) and Year 10 student Indiana Upton, each delivered an address to the school.

Beau's address:

"On 26 May, we acknowledge National Sorry Day. This day marks the anniversary of the tabling of the Bringing Them Home Report in the Australian Parliament in 1997. The report detailed the history of the forced removal of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children from their families, under laws enacted by Australian Governments.

This is what we know as 'The Stolen Generation'. Today, as a sign of respect for those traumatised and impacted by The Stolen Generation, our flags fly at half-mast.

The dates for National Reconciliation Week remain the same each year; 27 May to 3 June. These dates commemorate two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey— the successful 1967 referendum, and the High Court Mabo decision, respectively. The 1967 Referendum marked two key changes in Australian politics – Indigenous Australians being counted in the census as citizens and being able to have laws made for them.

The Mabo Decision, passed in 1993, was significant as it acknowledged Indigenous connection to the land and led to the introduction of the Native Title Act.

This year, the theme for National Reconciliation Week is 'Be a Voice for Generations'. In the year The Voice Referendum will take place, this theme encourages all Australians to be a voice for reconciliation in tangible ways in our lives.

Indiana's address:

"This day marks the handing down of the Bringing Them Home Report. Of the 27 recommendations, there has only been one implemented.

My great grandma was taken away from her country and family, as well as my grandma and uncle.

Today, we recognise those who were ripped away from their family and country by the government and put into communities where they had to act as if they were not Indigenous.

Aboriginal children are 17 times more likely to be removed from their families. Twice as likely to take their life by suicide and on average live 10 years less.

This shows the intergenerational trauma and the lasting impacts of the choices of the governments at the time.

We need our voices heard, Thankyou

"For the last three weeks, I have been taking part in the Victorian Young Leaders Indonesia program, where we have been collaborating with other students from Victoria and Indonesia to create a health and wellbeing campaign. My group created a campaign about how physical health impacts mental health and the benefits of exercise for mental health. Creating the campaign included creating posters, animations and a logo in English and Indonesian.

The program has been a great experience for learning about Indonesian culture as well as the language. I have very much enjoyed taking part in the program and would recommend it to anyone who was interested in taking part in it in the future. - Abigail Johnson Year 9.

"When I was offered the chance to go on a three week program to develop my Indonesian language skills, I couldn't refuse. Meeting new people while learning about mental and physical health, as well as health issues facing Indonesia, while learning Indonesian! We played lots of learning games. We also made posters and infographics, learnt lots of new vocabulary and made a website with a video to make a campaign about alcohol use among teenagers.

International Women's Day 2023 Pauline Toner Prize

In 2015, our local State Member of Parliament, Vicki Ward MP, created the Pauline Toner Prize to recognise the achievements of local young women active in the areas of social justice, the environment, and/or gender equality.

Vicki has paved this path through the recognition of the remarkable women in previous generations who worked hard to make all of this possible and in particular Pauline Toner, the first female Victorian State Government Minister, the first female State Member for Greensborough and the first female Mayor and Councillor for Diamond Valley.

The Pauline Toner Prize is made available to young women in Years 9 and above who live and/or study in the Seat of Eltham.

Our nominee for 2023 was Scarlett Harrison Year 10. Scarlett consistently demonstrates a commitment to protecting the environment and works closely with her local and school community to do so, as exemplified by her work in several fields related to the environment and disaster resilience.

At Eltham High School, Scarlett contributed to the "Cups for Change" program. A student-led initiative which targeted

single-use coffee cups and promoted awareness of the Eltham Copper Butterfly. Through this program, Scarlett and her peers raised funds for local environmental groups and the establishment of a garden for the Eltham Copper Butterfly.

Outside of school, Scarlett is closely linked with her local CFA group. As part of the Strathewen-Arthurs Creek Bushfire Education Partnership, Scarlett participated in a student-led evaluation, collaborating with her peers to design evaluation surveys, and presenting their results at the Australian Disaster Resilience Conference.

Scarlett has also written the foreword to the upcoming publication "School- based Education for Disaster Risk Reduction: A practice Framework for the Australian Emergency Management Sector", which will be published by Natural Hazards Research Australia.

Together we established a kitchen garden for our Food Technology Department so that students will have access to fresh herbs and vegetables when they cook. The two raised garden beds were planted with sage, thyme, rosemary, onions, chives, lettuce and rhubarb. Beside the beds we planted three broad bean plants, which we hear grow to be 6 feet tall! We are also working with the council to procure a compost tumbler to manage food waste from the student kitchen in a more sustainable way. The garden beds and compost system will be maintained by the Enviro Club with the help of the food tech teachers.














New House Patrons

TONER HOUSE - House Patron: Pauline Toner

The first female Cabinet member of Victoria, Pauline Toner was an advocate for the environment, community services, young people and education. She was a passionate campaigner and instigator of the Eltham Copper Butterfly Reserve, which is now named in her honour.

SKIPPER HOUSE - House Patron: Sonia Skipper

Sonia Skipper was a prolific artist and painter with works featured in collections across Australia. As the daughter of founding members of Montsalvat, she was responsible for constructing the barn at Montsalvat and completed several of the carvings in the main Montsalvat building. Sonia's legacy represents the shift towards recognising the contributions of female artists at Montsalvat.

PAKANA HOUSE - House Patron: Uncle Charles Pakana

Uncle Charles Pakana is an Indigenous Australian journalist and Head of Victorian Aboriginal News. He has worked extensively within mental health awareness and advocating for widespread acceptance for those with mental health issues.
